METHODOLOGY & NOTES



Web survey using computer-assisted Web interviewing (CAWI) technology.



Data collected from May 1th to May 10th, 2020.



1,959 Canadians (including Indigenous oversample of 450 Canadians), 18 years or older, randomly recruited from LEO's online panel.



No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample (Web panel in this case). However for comparative purposes, a probability sample of 1,526 respondents would have a margin of error of ±2.21%, 19 times out of 20. The research results presented here are in full compliance with the CRIC Public Opinion Research Standards and Disclosure Requirements.


The numbers presented have been rounded up. However, the numbers before rounding were used to calculate the sums presented and might therefore not correspond to the manual addition of these numbers. Indigenous Men are more afraid of contracting the Coronavirus (or that someone in their family will contract the virus)





... of contracting the COVID-19 (Coronavirus)?

■ ... that someone in your immediate family will be contracting the COVID-19 (Coronavirus)?

While the gap in fear of personally contracting the virus among Indigenous (54%) and non-Indigenous men (49%) is only **5%**, this gap doubles to **10%** with regard to fear of family members contracting the virus: 70% vs. 60%.

Over half of non-Visible Minorities (53%) state that the crisis has had no impact on their jobs.




